**2 Duncan Terrace and
Colebrooke Row**

Developed piecemeal from the late
18th century, these streets are good
places to look at the variety and detail
of late Georgian terraces.
The houses originally overlooked the
New River, which ran in the now
landscaped area between the streets.
St John the Evangelist Church dates
from 1841-3, with towers from 1877.

3 Joe Orton plaque
25 Noel Road N1

Playwright Joe Orton lived in a flat
here with his lover Kenneth Halliwell
from 1960-7.

4 Island Queen
87 Noel Road N1
T 020 7704 7631

Ornately decorated pub of 1851 and a
good place for a relaxed drink and lunch.

5 Polish Catholic Church

The Church of Our Lady of
Czestochowa & St Casimir began in
1852 as New Church College for the
Swedenborgians. When the college
moved in 1930, the building became
home to the Polish Catholic mission.

6 Former St Peter's Church

Originally a rather plain gothic
church by Charles Barry (1834-5), it
was fancifully embellished ten years
later with spire, flying buttresses and
other additions by Roumieu & Gough,
the architects of Milner Square.

7 Duke of Cambridge

London's first organic gastro pub.

**8 Saponara at Prebend
Street parade**

A cluster of neighbourhood shops,
including Saponara Italian deli & caffè.

9 St James's Church

Built in 1873-75 as a
successor to a medieval City church
by the Clothworkers' Company,
which developed much of the
neighbourhood. The adjacent
almshouses date from 1855.

10 Arlington Square

Developed in the 1850's,
the nearby streets are surprisingly
wide with modest two-storey houses.

11 The Social
Arlington Square

A comfortable pub with music
and exceptional food.

12 Tibby Place

Playground and green space
on the site of the old Tibberton Baths.
The colourful painted ironwork is all
that remains of the baths.

**13 Peabody Estate &
Peabody Yard**

Peabody Square (1865) was the first
of this familiar style of improved work-
ing class housing. The yard continues to
be a workplace with craft studios.

14 Former Carlton Cinema

A bingo hall since the 70s, the
Carlton opened in 1930 with Harold
Lloyd's first talkie, "Welcome Danger".
Its colourful Egyptian style façade is a
landmark and an exotic reminder of
the golden age of cinemas.

15 Regent's Canal

The canal emerges from
Islington Tunnel at Colebrooke Row,
one of several places where you can
get onto the towpath on this stretch.
It continues eastward, passing Victoria
Park and Mile End Park, joining the
Thames at Limehouse. The Islington
Boat Club offers affordable boating
lessons for boys and girls
(16-34 Graham Street, N1;
T 020 7253 0778).

16 Gainsborough Studios

In 1919 an old power plant in
Poole Street, just off New North Road,
became the centre of British film-
making. Hitchcock's "The Lodger" and
"The Lady Vanishes" were filmed here,
as was "Oh! Mr Porter" with Will Hay,
and a string of wartime comedies.

17 South Public Library

18 Farmers' Market

Essex Road opposite the Green.
Sundays, 10am-2pm. Seasonal
produce fresh from the farm, bread,
meat, cheese and honey.
