

**1 Highbury New Park**  
Begun in the 1850s as a 100-acre suburb in exuberant mid-Victorian style. St Augustine's Church (1869-70) was provided by developer Henry Rydon.

**2 Petherton Road**  
Attractively wide to accommodate the New River that once flowed between the roadways.

**3 Clissold Park, Stoke Newington**  
A short walk north from Newington Green via Green Lanes.

**4 Newington Green**  
Was a small medieval settlement that developed from the mid-17<sup>th</sup> century and became an urban square with railings in 1742. London's oldest surviving brick terrace (1658) at Nos 52-55 on the west side. 1708 Unitarian Chapel on the north side.

**5 Two Figs**  
101 Newington Green Road N1

Vegetarian deli, wholefood shop & mini café.

**6 St Paul's Shrubbery**  
Annual community festival held here in July.

**7 Mildmay Public Library**

**8 Canonbury Station**  
Silverlink trains to Kew & Richmond and to North Woolwich & the Woolwich Ferry.

**9 New River Walk**  
A miniature linear park opened in 1954. The ponds follow the course of Hugh Myddelton's New River, the 1613 aqueduct that brought drinking water to London from the Amwell and Chadwell springs in Hertfordshire.

**10 'The Glass House'**  
40 Douglas Road N1  
A 1990s glass version of its three-storey neighbours, tucked behind the Marquess Tavern. Quite a different back view from Arran Walk.

**11 St Stephen's Church**  
(1837-39) Enhanced by newly restored spire and facade.

**12 Canonbury House**  
Alwyne Villas, Alwyne Place & Alwyne Road roughly outline the old gardens of Canonbury House. Two polygonal brick summerhouses can still be seen. One at 4a Alwyne Villas has the date 1526 (and a 19<sup>th</sup> century upper floor). The other, stuccoed, is at 7 Alwyne Road.

**13 Canonbury Tower**  
Originally part of the old Manor House, the tower may date from the 16<sup>th</sup> century. The present Canonbury House is from c.1795.

**15 Union Chapel**  
Compton Terrace N1

Congregational chapel (1876-89, James Cubitt, architect) with proud High Victorian tower. Outstanding octagonal interior with seats for 1,650 on two levels. Varied programme of music and performance.

**16 Canonbury Park South**  
Another pleasant street for walking and an alternative to the New River Walk.
